Dear Friends in Christ:

They say not to talk about religion or politics in polite conversation. I say let's learn how to talk about religion and politics in healthy, respectful ways. They say religion and politics don't mix. I say religion and politics belong together like peanut butter belongs with jelly, like milk belongs with cookies.

Here's why I feel this way:

God is Sovereign. This is a central tenet of Presbyterians dating back to the Protestant Reformation when the reformers dared to interfere with the politics of a corrupt church-state alliance. God's reign extends beyond the church to all aspects of civil society. Separation of church and state is essential, in order to preserve the freedom of the church and individual Christians to shape, critique and, when necessary, overturn the powers-that-be. Fortunately in the United States we do not need to resort to revolutionary tactics to influence government. In the United States we influence government by voting.

People who don't vote say, "my vote won't matter." I say, vote for voting's sake. People who don't vote say, "all politicians are the same." I say, no they are not. Some people don't vote because they are angry at the government. I say, if you are angry at the government, one constructive thing you can very easily do is vote.

Our elected leaders have access to power. Their choices shape our common life for the better or for the worse. Old Testament prophets like Micah and Amos stood up to the Kings of Israel to demand justice. Similarly, economic justice was a constant theme in Jesus' teachings. Jesus spoke more about money than almost any other single topic. He objected to a religion focused on rituals instead of on people, justice and love.

Therefore, vote. Vote as a religious act. *Don't vote* for the candidates that will be best for you personally. *Do vote* for candidates who will promote justice for the poor, who will insist on careful stewardship of God's good earth, who will build bridges, de-escalate conflict, tell the truth, and help make America civil again.

Vote as an expression of gratitude for all God's blessings—including one of the most precious blessings of them all—the right to vote in the first place.

NOVEMBER WORSHIP NOTES

"Therefore God has highly exalted him. . .
that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow. . .
and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God."

(Philippians 2:9-11)

November 25 is Christ the King Sunday - the last Sunday of the Christian year, one week before the first Sunday of Advent. The "pattern of the Christian year keeps us centered in Christ as we seek to proclaim the story of our faith, grow as Jesus' disciples, and serve Christ's mission." (Book of Order W-1.0202) Advent begins the church year as a season to focus on the birth of God's Son in a Bethlehem manger, and to await the second coming of Christ. Through the course of the church year we celebrate Jesus' baptism, his transfiguration, his death on Good Friday, his resurrection on Easter, his ascension, the Day of Pentecost, Trinity Sunday and All Saints' Day. Christ the King Sunday celebrates the life, death and resurrection of Christ who now sits at the right hand of God and reigns over the universe. It is a time to give thanks and praise for the sovereignty of Christ "who loves us and has freed us from our sins by his blood and made us a kingdom . .who is and who was and who is to come, the Almighty." (Revelation 1:5,8)

Join us at 10:45 a.m. in the Chapel every November Sunday to give praise and thanks to God for the gift of Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior, our King. Two old familiar hymns tell of Christ's kingship. In 1746 Charles Wesley wrote, "Rejoice the Lord is King! Your Lord and King adore! Rejoice, give thanks, and sing, and triumph evermore; Lift up your heart, lift up your voice! Rejoice, again I say, rejoice." In 1851 Matthew Bridges wrote, "Crown Him with many crowns, the Lamb upon His throne; hark how the heavenly anthem drowns all music but its own! Awake, my soul and sing of Him who died for thee, and hail Him as thy matchless King through all eternity." Thanks be to God!

CONSECRATION SUNDAY IS COMING!

"Become Rich in What Matters to God" is the theme for our stewardship education emphasis this year, leading up to Consecration Sunday on November 18. Over the next few weeks, we invite you to reflect on what this phrase means to you. How does supporting the church's mission and ministry with a percentage of your income help you grow spiritually in your relationship with God?

Once again this year, the Session has selected the New Consecration Sunday Stewardship Program to help us in our understanding of the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving. This program is based on the biblical philosophy of the need of the giver to give for his or her own spiritual development, rather than on the need of the church to receive. Instead of viewing ourselves as members of a social club who should pay dues, we will strive to be followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship. We will look to respond to the question "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?"

During morning worship on Consecration Sunday, we will make our financial commitments to our church's ministries by completing an Estimate of Giving Card. Participation is voluntary, but we do urge everyone to attend, even those who feel reluctant to complete a card. The process will be led in such a way that no one will feel awkward if he or she chooses not to fill out a card.

We will not make visits or phone calls to ask for pledges. We will reach out to invite everyone to attend worship on Consecration Sunday and stay afterwards for the Celebration Luncheon. During morning worship, our guest leader, Elder Judy Tharaud, will conduct a brief period of instruction and inspiration. This will be followed by quiet time in the pews to complete Estimate of Giving cards as a confidential act of worship.

OUR CONSECRATION SUNDAY GUEST LEADER

Judy Tharaud, our Guest Leader on Consecration Sunday, has been a familiar face at Newark Presbytery for many years. We continued the BPCOG Prayer Chain, including all of our Deacons and Prayer Triplets.

We delivered the Sunday Worship Flowers to our shut-ins, those in the hospital, those experiencing difficult times and those celebrating special occasions.

We prepared and cleaned up Communion on Communion Sundays.

We continued to sponsor Renata Aritzabeth Gonzales Vidal, who lives in Mexico, through ChildFund and mailed a letter to her from the church family.

FAITH COMMUNITY NURSE NOTES

Advance Directives - a very important topic that many of us find difficult to discuss. What are Advance Directives? They are the legal documents that allow you to give direction to medical personnel, family and friends concerning your future medical care when you cannot speak for yourself. There are 3 components in an Advance Directive:

<u>A Living Will (Instruction Directive)</u> - This is a set of instructions regarding your wishes about life sustaining medical care such as dialysis, breathing machines, resuscitation if you stop breathing or your heart stops, tube feedings and organ or tissue donation after your death. It is used when you are terminally ill, incapacitated or unable to communicate and make decisions. It protects your right to accept or refuse medical care.

<u>A Health Care Proxy</u> - This is the person you designate to make your medical decisions if you are unable to do so. He/she may need to use their own judgment when your wishes are not known. You want to choose someone who knows you and your wishes well.

<u>A Durable Power of Attorney for Health Care (Proxy Directive)</u> - This is a legal document that names your healthcare proxy. It is different from a Durable Power of Attorney for Finances, where you designate someone to manage your financial affairs when you are unable to do so. You may choose the same person for both, or choose 2 different people.

Completing Advance Directives provides direction for the medical professionals and removes the burden of decision making from family and friends at a time when they are already under a great deal of stress. Time after time, those of us in healthcare have had families tell us that they wish they had completed Advance Directives before the medical crisis occurred. You do not need a lawyer to complete these forms.

How can you get started?

- Δ Make a list of the 3 most important things you want those close to you to know about your wishes for end-of-life care.
- Δ Think about who you would want to make your medical decisions for you if you could not speak for yourself.
- Δ Plan when and where you might want to talk to that person and others close to you about your wishes.
- Δ Make a list of questions you would like to ask your healthcare provider or Faith Community Nurse and get those questions answered.
- Δ Download the New Jersey forms for a Living Will and Durable Power of Attorney: www.state.nj.us/health/advancedirective/ad/forums-faqs/ or ask your healthcare provider for the forms.
- Δ Fill out the Living Will (Instruction Directive) and Durable Power of Attorney for Health Care (Proxy Directive). Once completed, they should be signed, dated, witnessed (2 witnesses) and copied. You should keep a copy and give a copy to your healthcare provider.
