Dear Friends in Christ:

Will you be home for holidays this year? Do you want to be? Where is home? Is home where you are from originally? Or is home where you are now? What makes a house a home? What makes an apartment a home? Do you like being at home? Or is it lonely?

With the holiday season upon us, the retail stores have started playing Christmas music. Chances are we'll all hear Bing Crosby croon, "I'll be Home for Christmas," at least a hundred times between now and December 25. How does his sentimental classic about snow, mistletoe, and "lovelight gleaming" make you feel? Do you love it? Or does it make you sad? Or both?

Home means different things to different people. Two people who grow up in the same home can have very different experiences. Is home a place? If so, then why do we say we feel "at home" with certain people but not others? The rare person living in his or her childhood home may nevertheless feel "homesick" for an earlier time, half-remembered and half-imagined.

As your pastor, I want nothing more than for each of you to feel "at home" with God. That means I also want you to feel "at home" in church. My idea of a perfect church has nothing to do with size or social stature or budget. To me, a perfect church finds a way to say, in so many words, to each and every person who walks in the door, "Welcome. We've been expecting *you*. Welcome *home*."

Whoever you are, and however you may be feeling about the holidays, or about church, or about God, please, come home. Come home to church. Come each Sunday in December to hear and remember how God climbed down from heaven's splendor to make his home with us.

"Come home, come home; you who are weary, come home," goes the old 19th-century revival hymn.

No matter how long you've been away, or for what reasons, you are hereby cordially and sincerely invited *home for holidays*.

FROM THE CLERK’S DESK:

Notes from the Session meeting of October 17. . .

Buildings and Grounds Team:

1. Approved the expenditure of \$7,200 from endowment funds to replace the existing Chapel ceiling lights with LED lights and dimmer switches. LED lights are more efficient, environmentally friendly and will save money over the long run compared with the current fluorescent lights (which often don’t work when needed).
2. Approved a “Shine the Light” fund-raising campaign to help offset the cost of the new lights. The campaign would be similar to the one run for repair of the Westminster Chimes.
3. Reported that the second floor hall lights in the Education Building will be upgraded at a cost of \$1,350. The lights have become a safety hazard and need to be replaced.

Education Team:

1. Approved a Church Scholarship to Jennifer Dalzell-Sobrera (graduate student Rutgers-Newark).
2. Reported that the team is looking into strategies for improved communication with parents with a goal of increasing parent participation in education programming.

Worship Team:

1. Approved the 2019 Communion Schedule as follows -
January 6 February 3 March 3 March 6 (Ash Wednesday) April 7
April 18 (Maundy Thursday) April 21 (Easter) May 5 June 2 July 7
August 4 September 8 (second Sunday) October 6 (World Communion)
November 3 December 1 (Advent)
2. Noted that 10:45 a.m. services will end on Sunday, June 30 and resume on Sunday, September 1. Worship services will be at 10:00 a.m. July 7 – August 15.

THE MINISTRY OF THE DEACONS

Some of our organizational structures are left over from decades ago when we were a much larger congregation. Should they stay or should they go? The Session has been grappling with that question as it relates to the Board of Deacons. Although we are a caring church full of caring people, positions on the Board have been difficult to fill in recent years. We asked ourselves, why? Does the structure inherited from previous years still fit our current situation?

We consulted the Book of Order and learned that deacons don't always have to be organized into a formal board. Deacons can also be "individually commissioned" to particular roles. Could this be an option? All agreed that visiting elderly and homebound church members and making hospital visits were top priority tasks.

We asked ourselves, what if we dissolved our 1950s-style Board with moderator, secretary, treasurer, minutes, manual of operations, monthly meetings, etc. etc. etc. and switched to the practice of commissioning individual deacons for the specific work of making friendly visits, without all the other strings attached?

After prayerful consideration and in consultation with the Moderator of the Deacons, the Session voted to do just that. At the Annual Meeting in January the congregation will be asked to vote on changes to the bylaws in order to try this new approach. We are checking with other churches who use individually commissioned deacons to find out what works and learn what pitfalls to avoid. We'll be looking for people with a passion for visiting to be commissioned as Deacons who will work closely with our Faith Community Nurse and with Pastor Ruth to provide care for the congregation. Watch for more info.

We are hopeful that this new approach will succeed. This decision is in keeping with the Revitalization Initiative that calls for letting go of what no longer works in order to devote more energy and resources to what is needed now and in the future.

DECEMBER 9TH OPEN HOUSE AT THE MANSE

Pastor Ruth and the Board of Deacons will be co-hosting our Annual Manse Open House immediately following worship on December 9th. This is an opportunity to share food and fellowship while remembering an important family in our church history, the *Jarvie* family. *James Newbegin Jarvie* (1853-1929) was a prominent businessman in coffee and sugar importing, who lived in Bloomfield. He was a Charter Member and Sunday School teacher at the former Westminster Presbyterian Church. He donated the monies to build *Jarvie Hall*, adjacent to the church. Dedicated to his parents, *Jarvie Hall* housed the first public library in Bloomfield, as well as being used for numerous church activities. *James N. Jarvie* later donated monies for *Helen's Manse*, in memory of his wife, *Helen Newton Jarvie*. This brick building, located at 451 Franklin Street, was home to Westminster pastors and their families. Each year on January 1st, the pastors and their wives hosted a New Year's Day Reception in honor of *Helen N. Jarvie's* birthday. Located next to the Westminster Arts Center, it is now owned by Bloomfield College. The old grandfather clock which graced *Helen's Manse* is now located in our Park Place manse. The Westminster congregation was forever grateful for the many generous endowments and bequests from *James N. Jarvie* and his sister, *Margaret Jarvie*.

These monies were an on-going source of financial support, and included the *Helen's Fund*, used to assist those in the church family with emergency financial needs. The *Jarvie* funds were transferred to Bloomfield Presbyterian Church on the Green at the time of the merger in 1966 and have continued to support our church and its ministry.

James N. Jarvie's benevolence extended far beyond Westminster. The *Jarvie Commonweal Fund*, was established in 1925 "to offer relief to the aged within the Protestant faith, and residing within 50 miles of New York City . . . who in their declining years find themselves without sufficient means of support." In 1934, the fiduciary and administrative responsibility for this fund was transferred to the Board of National Missions of the Presbyterian Church, through the Presbyterian Foundation.

Please plan to join us on December 9th immediately after worship in the manse, as we take some time to share some holiday spirit and remember *Helen Newton Jarvie* and the entire *Jarvie* family.

NEW CONSECRATION SUNDAY UPDATE

Consecration Sunday was a joyful day on November 18, beginning with worship and an inspirational sermon by our guest leader, Elder Judy Tharaud, culminating in the presentation of our Estimate of Giving Cards at the end of the service. During our Celebration Luncheon after worship we enjoyed a sumptuous spread and an entertaining skit, called "Remember, Celebrate, Dream: A Stewardship Carol," based on the Charles Dickens holiday classic.

The results to date have been tallied and were announced in worship the following Sunday. Below is a summary.

- A total of 35 giving units (husbands and wives, or single persons) completed Estimate of Giving Cards so far this year.
- A total of 25 of these giving units increased their financial commitment above their last year's amount.
- A total of 35 giving units have already filled out Estimate of Giving Cards, committing a total of \$84,145.16.
- Based on last year's giving records, we can expect to receive \$15,930 during the coming year from people who have consistent giving patterns during the past twelve months but who have not pledged this year.
- Based on the average total of loose plate offerings during the past three years, we can expect to receive \$1,500 during the coming year from that source.
- Church income from non-donor sources such as interest, rentals, and fees was \$48,546.
- This gives us a grand total of \$150,121 anticipated income during the next twelve months.
- The total income for our general operating budget during the last twelve months was \$135,046.
- Next year, we can expect our operating budget income to increase by \$15,075.
- This is an 11.16% increase in total giving above last year.
- The additional amount to meet our operating expenses comes from the church's investments.

A warm thank you to everyone who participated and to the members of the Finance and Stewardship Team for their diligent work. Let us all stay focused on the goal to “become rich in what matters to God.”

FAITH COMMUNITY NURSE NOTES

Christmas is coming! As we prepare our homes for our Christmas, and plan our very busy holiday schedules, we need to remember some very important health and safety tips to maintain mind-body-spirit balance.



- ◆ When you travel, do not drink and drive. Be sure everyone in the vehicle is in a seat belt and observe speed limits.
- ◆ Do not post your travel plans on social media.
- ◆ Wash your hands often to avoid spreading germs. Use soap and running water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol based product.
- ◆ Avoid overeating. Take a walk with family/friends after your holiday meal. Focus more on family/friends and less on all of the holiday foods.
- ◆ Be careful climbing ladders. Heed all warnings printed on your ladder.
- ◆ Do not use outdoor lights indoors - they burn hotter. Do not use indoor lights outdoors – they are not waterproof.
- ◆ Inspect all decorations for damage before use. Cracked or damaged sockets, loose or bare wires or loose connections can cause a shock or fire.
- ◆ Check all decorations for certification labels: Underwriters Laboratories (UL) or Intertek (ETL). Decorations not bearing a label from an independent testing laboratory should not be used.
- ◆ Do not overload electrical outlets. Plug only one high wattage appliance into an outlet at a time. Never connect more than 3 strings of lights together.
- ◆ Do not place electrical cords under rugs or near heat sources.
- ◆ Keep combustibles at least 3 feet from any heat source. One half of home decoration fires occur because of decorations that are too close. (National Fire Protection Association)
- ◆ Turn off, unplug and extinguish all decorations when going to sleep or leaving the house.
- ◆ Consider battery operated candles. Candles start almost one half of home decoration fires. (National Fire Protection Association)
- ◆ If you have a live Christmas tree, water it daily. Dry trees are a fire hazard.
- ◆ Manage stress. The holidays can take a toll on your health. Keep a check on over-commitment and over-spending. Focus on what is important. Don't become overwhelmed. Maybe it's time to drop a tradition that you only do because you've always done it.
- ◆ Balance work, home and play. It's okay to say no to a party and take time to relax. Be sure to get enough sleep.
- ◆ Keep Christ in Christmas. Attend Sunday worship throughout Advent at 10:45 AM, come to our Live Nativity on December 21st at 7 PM, make time for our 8 PM Christmas Eve Service. Renew your spirit by remembering the real meaning of Christmas.

We still have our first chapel organ sitting in the narthex and it is looking for a great home. Ask around. It is available for a donation. It still makes a glorious sound.

GREEN CHURCH, GREEN WORLD

The raging fires burning whole towns in California, together with the ominous UN special report on climate change, are two reminders that climate change is real, dangerous, and already here. But what can the average person do? And stewards of God’s creation, do we have a special role to play as a church?

With a seed grant from the Presbytery of Newark, the “Green Church, Green World” project has come into being in response to these questions. The project grew out of a simple inquiry by our Buildings and Grounds Committee into the feasibility of installing solar panels on the Church’s rooftop to save money. This led to deeper conversations about whether God might be calling us to lead a larger community-wide effort to take hopeful action in response to catastrophic climate change. A vision emerged for a new ministry to engage our neighbors, the business community, educators, students and local government leaders to collaborate in providing a just and sustainable energy future for Bloomfield and beyond.

With Session’s support, the church is partnering with the nonprofit start-up, SolarNation, which will guide us through a three-step process starting in 2019:

- 1.Support Bloomfield to self-organize, develop, & self-financing local community-scale solar projects.
- 2.Help participants engage in additional carbon reducing (net zero) activities.
- 3.Help grow a local movement to educate and help other communities do the same.

SolarNation provides an online platform, on-the-ground resources, and access to expert help with administrative, legal, financial, regulatory, communications, and organizational tasks. This leaves the community to focus purely on mobilization. In a 12-month campaign, volunteer community participants recruit more participants, find crowdfunding investors, find solar energy subscribers and/or raise donations. SolarNation facilitates every step and guides the campaigns to spread beyond the initial community.

“Green Church, Green World” will serve as a demonstration project showing how a church can lead a community to overcome climate change denial and despair to take hopeful action. An

integral part of the mission is to engage other churches in the presbytery and synod to replicate the model.

Catastrophic climate change is not inevitable, but it will take thoughtful, prayerful, intentional and immediate action, to overcome it. Please contact Carlos Monteagudo to become part of this exciting movement!
